NEW PROVIDENCE BOARD OF HEALTH

THE NEW PROVIDENCE HEALTH DEPARTMENT

The Board of Health of New Providence is affiliated with Westfield Regional Health Department, located at 425 East Broad Street, Westfield, New Jersey, 07090 (908-789-4070). The Westfield Regional Health Department offers a variety of health services for children, adults, and senior citizens.

The Borough of New Providence provides residents the services of a Public Health Nurse. The nurse's office is located on the third floor of the New Providence Municipal Center. The nurse is available from 8 AM - 3 PM on most Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. The office number is (908) 743-1049. The in-office services include blood pressure screening, health information and referral services. The nurse is available to make visits to home-bound residents with referrals.

CHILDREN / ADULTS / SENIORS

Well-Child Clinics are conducted on a monthly basis by the Westfield Regional Health Department. Services include immunizations, physical examinations and lead testing. The clinics are free of charge for residents without health insurance coverage or for those residents lacking immunization coverage. Appointments are required and are available by calling the Westfield Regional Health Department at (908) 789-4070.

Details/Information on the **Seasonal Flu Clinics**, offered each fall for borough residents, are publicized on the borough website and the local newspaper. Residents pay a nominal fee for the flu shot or obtain reimbursement from Medicare if they have Medicare Health coverage. Call the Public Health Nurse for additional information at (908) 743-1049.

ADULTS / SENIORS

Free blood pressure screenings are held at the DeCorso Community Center at New Providence, located at 15 East Fourth Street, on Wednesdays, from 9:30 – 11 AM, except for the first Wednesday of each month.

The New Providence Senior Citizen Health Fair is held yearly in the spring, free of charge, for all residents ages 62 years and older. The health fair offers a comprehensive list of services, health screenings and information provided by local health professionals and businesses. Check the borough website, and local newspapers for details.

PARKING INFORMATION 908-665-1400 X 0 - Permit Parking Info.

The Borough has two parking lots for commuters:

1. New Providence Train Station – parking lot is located at 866 Springfield Avenue, between Willow Street and the tracks, opposite Pittsford Way. Permits, for Borough residents only, are \$325 a year available at the start of the fiscal year only (April 1) or \$90 per quarter (subject to change).

2. Murray Hill Train Station – parking lot is located at 1 Foley Place, at the corner of Southgate Road. Permits are available for residents (as above) and for non-residents. Non-resident permits are \$1,050 a year available at the start of the fiscal year only (April 1) or \$290 per quarter. Metered parking is also available along Floral Avenue, between South Street and Foley Place, for anyone, at \$7 per day. The meter is located at the train station and accepts cash in the exact amount, Smart Cards, which can be purchased at the Clerk's Office, and credit cards (Visa, MasterCard or Discover only).

For further information about commuter parking, call the Clerk's Office at 908-665-1400 x 0 or check www.newprov.org. Permits must be displayed on all cars parked in these lots or else a summons will be issued.

DOG AND CAT LICENSES

Dog and cat licenses are due by January 31 of each year. There is a \$5 late fee if purchased after February 28 (excluding first time licensing). If your pet is not due for a rabies shot before February 28, check with your veterinarian for a booster shot. If he/she does not recommend a booster, ask for a letter explaining and submit that letter with license renewal.

DOG AND CAT RABIES CLINIC:

Clinic will be held on Saturday, January 9, 2016 in the Municipal Center from 8—9 AM.

LOCAL REGULATIONS

The speed limit in New Providence is 25 mph unless otherwise posted.

Lock your car and take the key. Do not leave valuables in plain sight in your car.

OVERNIGHT PARKING There is NO PARKING on any street or in any municipal parking lot from 2—5 AM.

SNOW REMOVAL Snow must be removed from public sidewalks within the first 24 hours from the time the storm ends. Sidewalks must be cleared to a 4 foot width. Do not plow or place snow onto roadways. Ice on sidewalks must be either removed or covered with salt, sawdust, sand or ashes within the first 24 hours after the formation of the ice.

BUILDING SAFETY IS NO ACCIDENT. The Borough Office of Planning & Development reminds you to contact their department before you plan a construction and/or development project. The following is a partial listing of projects which usually require prior approval and a zoning and or construction permit:

Building or Installation of the following items: Decks, patios, covered patios, fence, garages, chimneys, ventilation systems, heating or air conditioning, supply or exhaust systems, swimming pool, or sheds.

Changing or additions to rooms: Including but not limited to kitchen, bathrooms, basements, demolition of or installing walls, converting garage, enclosing porches and dormers. Any plumbing or electrical changes such as replacement of gas or oil fired equipment, service upgrades, etc.

Demolition: Any structure, or part of a structure, and or any other changes that affect a structure. Sheds or in-ground pools would be included as well, as this would ensure that the structures are removed from the tax rolls.

Zoning & Land Use: Zoning review is a prerequisite to some construction permit applications. Zoning requirements are available on our website or by calling our office at (908) 665-1098. Questions regarding board applications, drainage or grading call (908) 665-1124.

What is Carbon Monoxide?

Carbon monoxide, or CO, is a colorless, tasteless and odorless gas. Because it can't be seen, tasted or smelled, its toxic fumes can kill you before you are even aware that it is present in your home. At lower levels of exposure, CO causes mild effects that are often mistaken for the flu, with symptoms that include headaches, dizziness, disorientation, nausea and fatigue. The effects of CO exposure can vary greatly from person to person depending on age, overall health, and the concentration and length of exposure.

Carbon Monoxide Detectors

Install at least one UL (Underwriters Laboratories) listed carbon monoxide detector with an audible warning signal outside of each sleeping area of your home. Carbon monoxide detectors measure levels of CO over time and are designed to sound an alarm before an average healthy adult would experience symptoms. It's possible that you may not be experiencing symptoms when you hear the alarm, but this does not mean that CO is not present. If you have any **NON-EMERGENCY** questions, call New Providence Fire Prevention (908) 665-1098.


IF YOUR FIRE ALARM SOUNDS, CALL 911 AND EVACUATE THE BUILDING

Prepare for Fires at Home

- At a minimum, smoke detectors should be located on every floor level and not more than 10 feet from each bedroom. For additional protection, smoke detectors should be placed inside of each sleeping area.
- If your smoke detectors were installed 7-10 years ago, you should consider replacing them.
- Have a designated meeting place outside of the home.
- Practice home fire drills.

Household Garbage Collection (One Day Per Week)

TUESDAY, THURSDAY, OR FRIDAY

Please see the Garbage Collection Zones (Street List), pages 3 & 4, to determine your particular zone and thus, your day of the week for collection. Please note the symbol that corresponds to your pick up zone. **Garbage pickup may begin as early as 5 AM. DO NOT place recycling, bulk or household waste at the curb prior to 5 PM the day before scheduled pick-up.**

General household garbage is collected in the borough ONCE PER WEEK, on Tuesdays, Thursdays, & Fridays. However, please note changes that occur on the following 2016 Holidays: New Year's Day (Friday, Jan.1) and Thanksgiving Day (Thursday, Nov. 24)

When these holidays occur, for that week only, collections are all moved ahead one day. Collection for New Year's Day will be Saturday, Jan. 2. Collection for THANKSGIVING DAY will be on Friday, Nov. 25 and the Friday route will be on Saturday, Nov. 26.

Household garbage is normal domestic garbage, which does not include bulk items, construction debris, hazardous waste, recyclable items, grass, brush and garden debris, and/or leaves. As of January 1, 2011 all electronic equipment must be recycled (TV, radios, VCRs, stereos, etc.). You may no longer put them out with your bulk pickup. Instead, you can bring them to the public works yard Monday - Friday, 7 AM – 2 PM. Please see the information regarding BULK collection, Hazardous Waste, Recycling, Grass, Brush and Garden Debris, and Leaf Collection in other sections found in this calendar.

All disposed materials are taken to the Union County Utilities Authority's Resource Recovery Facility on U. S. Route 1 in Rahway, New Jersey.

The borough contracts annually for a special collection of what is generally known as bulk waste. **Bulk Items** are items that are too large to fit in a regular garbage can, such as rugs and carpeting (must be rolled and tied in liftable bundles and cannot be longer than four (4) feet in length), furniture, mattresses, household items, etc. Please see guidelines below for items that will **not** be collected with bulk.

**IMPORTANT: YOU MAY NOT DROP OFF THE BULK ITEMS ABOVE AT THE DPW YARD!
THEY MUST BE PUT AT THE CURB FOR PICK UP BY THE GARBAGE COMPANY.**

All materials for disposal must be placed curbside, separated from normal household garbage, grass, brush materials, and recyclable materials, by 5 AM on the designated MONDAY for your zone.

While the actual collections will take more than one day in a given zone, once the truck has completed collection on your street, it will NOT return.

BULK ITEMS THAT WILL NOT BE TAKEN

The following items **MAY NOT** be put out with bulk and **MAY NOT** be brought to the DPW Yard at any time. You must arrange for a private disposal company to remove the following items:

- **Construction debris** and materials, such as sheet rock, concrete, brick, lumber, plaster, roof shingles and other roofing materials, garage doors, etc.
- **Firewood**, logs, trees, stumps, tree parts or any other type of garden waste
- **Cardboard** and similar packing materials will not be collected, as they are to be recycled on the regular recycling day. Please see additional information under **Recycling Collection on Page 19 of this calendar.**

BULK ITEMS THAT MAY BE BROUGHT TO DPW

The following recyclable items **MAY NOT** be put out with bulk but **MAY** be brought to the DPW Yard Monday - Friday, 7 AM – 2 PM:

- **Household Appliances** (washing machines, dryers, refrigerators, hot water heaters, dehumidifiers, dishwashers, stoves, A/C units, etc.)
- **Metal Items**—Any metal item may be brought to the public works yard during days and hours above
- **Rigid Plastic** (plastic outdoor play furniture, plastic sand boxes, plastic pools, large plastic toys, etc.)
- **Electronic Equipment** (all electronic equipment must be recycled—telephones, answering machines, fax machines, computers, printers, copiers, monitors, televisions, radios, VCRs, cameras, audio/stereo equipment, etc.)
- **Rimless Tires, Used Motor Oil and Antifreeze**
- **Paint Cans** if completely empty and dry (lids have been removed and sufficient time has elapsed for paint to dry into a solid mass). **DO NOT POUR PAINT DOWN SINK OR STORM DRAINS, AS THIS IS A VIOLATION OF ENVIRONMENTAL LAWS**
- **Empty Gasoline Cans, Propane Tanks, and Gasoline-powered Equipment** (Propane gas tanks may also be taken to a propane supplier.)
- **Rechargeable Batteries and Car Batteries** (alkaline batteries can be put in regular household garbage)
- **Fluorescent Light Bulbs**

The items above can all be co-mingled (put together) in one receptacle. (Household batteries may be placed in regular trash. Recyclable batteries should be brought to the library. See page 27 for details.)

BOROUGH TREE REMOVAL PERMIT REQUIREMENTS

Chapter 247 of the Code of Borough of New Providence states:

No tree, in excess of four (4) inches in diameter measured one (1) foot above the ground, can be removed in the Borough of New Providence without first obtaining a tree removal permit from the Office of Planning & Development.

Any person, or persons, or company, etc. desiring to destroy and/or remove a tree of the above noted size, or larger, must first complete an application form for this permit, at the Office of Planning & Development in the Municipal Building. Said application needs to include, among other requirements, a sketch of the affected property indicating the locations of all trees, including those that are desired to be removed.

FEES FOR TREE REMOVAL ARE AS FOLLOWS:

- A. \$10 per tree for the first three (3) healthy trees removed from a property.
- B. Fourth healthy tree and beyond, \$55 per tree if the tree IS being replaced.
- C. Fourth healthy tree and beyond, if the tree IS NOT being Replaced, \$110 per tree, with \$75 dedicated to the Tree Replacement Fund
- D. No charge if the tree is dead, diseased or hazardous (documentation required).

In some instances, tree replacement may be required depending on location (see Chapter 247-6 for further specifications).

PENALTIES FOR FAILURE TO OBTAIN PERMIT ARE AS FOLLOWS:

- A. Owner or tenant shall pay \$100 per tree, up to the first three (3) trees, and \$300 per tree, in excess of the first three (3) trees.
- B. Contractor or Tree Service shall pay \$1,000 per tree

ADDITIONAL PUBLIC WORKS INFORMATION

The following additional Public Works related information is offered for your reference and use:

1. STREET LIGHTS:

The Borough pays for all street lighting, on both Borough and Union County streets. Even when an individual light is burned out it still appears on the bill. When a light is on all day long it usually means that the photoelectric cell, which activates the light, has burned out and the light itself will soon burn out. All residents are strongly encouraged to please report burned out street lights, or lights on all day long, by calling the customer service telephone number on your own individual electric bill or go to www.firstenergycorp.com. Report the utility pole number (Example: NP786E) found on the tag at "eye height," and its location (Example: corner of Livingston Avenue and Fourth Street or # XYZ Springfield Avenue).

2. TRAFFIC SIGNALS:

All traffic signals in the Borough, except for the New Jersey Transit crossing gates and signals, even when located on Union County streets, are owned and maintained by the Borough. Due to the virtual necessity of these signals and the resultant liability if they are not fully functioning, please report any burned out traffic signal bulbs or any other unusual condition to the Police Department by telephoning, as soon as possible, 665-1111. Each reported condition will be immediately checked out and repaired as soon as possible thereafter by either the Public Works Department or contractor.

3. POTHOLES AND ADVERSE ROAD CONDITIONS:

Mountain Avenue, Passaic Street, Springfield Avenue and South Street are Union County streets and are maintained by The County of Union Department of Public Works. All other streets are Borough owned and maintained by the Borough of New Providence Department of Public Works.





The New Providence Memorial Library (NPML) was opened in 1921 and has greatly expanded over the years. The Memorial Library is home to over 70,000 volumes of books and reference materials and over 120 different periodicals, which it lends free of charge to any resident in town. It also provides access to eBooks through ListenNJ for a variety of devices, such as Kindles, iPods, Nooks, MP3 players, Sony eReaders, Androids, BlackBerrys and iPads.

A Reference Librarian is always available in person, by phone or by email (Email: npmlref@yahoo.com), to answer patron's questions, help with research, or assist students with assignments. A host of online resources, including audio books, ancestry information, and reference databases, can be accessed by the general public through direct Internet connection at home or in the Library.

The Children's Room Librarian schedules meeting clubs, programs, movies, storytimes, and crafts. The Children's Room features toys and puzzles. A special Young Adult section provides reading material geared to the teenager.

The NPML Librarian schedules a variety of programs and monthly art shows and displays and coordinates the use of the library meeting rooms available to community groups. Every Tuesday a free movie is shown at 2 PM.

Serving the library, in addition to regular staff, are many volunteers and an active Friends of the Library group. The Friends publish a newsletter, provide community liaison activities, sponsor an annual book sale, raise funds, and collect gently used books in excellent condition, DVDs and music CDs for the Afterwords Bookshop, located in the basement of the Library.

The NPML is also a member of MUF (the Morris-Union Federation), which is a consortium of nine area libraries sharing holdings of over 800,000 books, 50,000 media items, and 2,200 magazines and newspapers. MUF libraries include Bernardsville, Berkeley Heights, Bernards Township, The Chathams, Long Hill Township, Madison, Morristown / Morris Township, New Providence, and Summit. Your card from a MUF Library may be used at all nine libraries.

The New Providence Memorial Library is located at 377 Elkwood Avenue, across from the Municipal Center.

Solutions to Stormwater Pollution - *Easy Things You Can Do Every Day to Protect Our Water*

As a resident, business, or other member of the New Jersey community, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day to protect our water.

Limit your use of fertilizers and pesticides

- Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer.
- Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is predicted.
- Look into alternatives for pesticides.
- Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your property or yard in a natural state with trees and other native vegetation that require little or no fertilizer.
- If you use fertilizers and pesticides, follow the instructions on the label on how to correctly apply it.
- Make sure you properly store or discard any unused portions.

Properly use and dispose of hazardous products

- Hazardous products include some household or commercial cleaning products, lawn and garden care products, motor oil, antifreeze and paints.
- Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local water bodies and the water is not treated.
- If you have hazardous products in your home or workplace, make sure you store or dispose of them properly. Read the label for guidance.
- Use natural or less toxic alternatives when possible.
- Recycle used motor oil.
- Contact your municipality, county or facility management office for the locations of hazardous-waste disposal facilities. (see page 19)

Keep pollution out of storm drains

- Municipalities and many other public agencies are required to mark certain storm drain inlets with messages reminding people that storm drains are connected to local water bodies.
- Do not let sewage or other wastes flow into a stormwater system. Clean up after your pet.
- Many municipalities and public agencies must enact and enforce local pet-waste rules.
- An example is requiring pet owners or their keepers to pick up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or other people's property.
- Make sure you know your town's or other agency's requirements and comply with them. It's the law. And remember to:
 - Use newspaper, bags, or pooper-scoopers to pick up wastes.
 - Dispose of the wrapped pet waste in the trash or unwrapped in a toilet.
 - Never discard pet waste in a storm drain.

Don't feed wildlife

- Do not feed wildlife, such as ducks and geese, in public areas.
- Many municipalities and other public agencies must enact and enforce a rule that prohibits wildlife feeding in these areas.

Dispose of yard waste properly

- Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains.
- If your municipality or agency has yard waste collection rules, follow them.
- Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost.
- Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn

Don't litter

- Place litter in trash receptacles.
- Recycle. Recycle. Recycle.
- Participate in community cleanups.

A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water

Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking water supplies and the ocean and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, pet waste, grass clippings: you name it and it ends up in our water.

Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we're all doing something about it.

By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater. It all adds up to cleaner water, and it saves the high cost of cleaning up once it's dirty.

As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, many municipalities and other public agencies including colleges and military bases must adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines or other penalties.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

BE PREPARED FOR AN EMERGENCY:

1. Create an Emergency Plan. Contact your local American Red Cross Chapter at 908-273-2076 for information on potential disasters in your area.
[Register to receive Code Red messages at www.newprov.org](http://www.newprov.org)
2. Put your plan down on paper and practice your escape plan once a month.
3. Designate an emergency meeting place in case you are separated from family members.
4. Prepare a Disaster Supplies Kit.

The next time disaster strikes, you may not have much time to act. Whether the emergency is a power outage, winter storm, fire, hurricane, flood or thunderstorm, the best thing to do is to prepare now. Speak with your family members and prepare an emergency plan. Include special provisions for children and for any disabled family members. Remember, your children may be in school during the emergency. Once you have devised a plan, be sure to post it in your home so that all family members can refer to it easily. More importantly, practice your plan once a month by holding emergency escape drills. Test your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors and change the batteries regularly. Be sure to keep a disaster supplies kit up to date. The following list will help you get started.

- Flashlights
- Battery operated or crank radio
- Extra batteries (fresh)
- Bottled water (1 gallon per day per person for 3 days)
- Sanitation supplies (bleach, etc.)
- Canned goods and non-perishable items (3 days supply)
- Manual can opener
- Candles and matches in waterproof container
- First Aid Kit and Prescription Medications
- Extra pet supplies
- Cellular telephone (if available)
- Special items for infants, elderly, or disabled family members.

2. CHECK EMERGENCY NOTICES at www.newprov.org
3. FOLLOW INSTRUCTIONS OF EMERGENCY OFFICIALS VIA CODE RED—You may be asked to take shelter or you may be asked to evacuate.
